

OVERVIEW OF PLAN B PROJECT

Plan B is a joint initiative between BRL and AXIS to reuse vacant units in Ballymun.

There has been negative impacts on commercial activity due to the economic downturn, leading to an increase in the number of vacant retail and commercial properties across the city. These empty properties are often hoarded up or left unattended, creating a dead streetscape.

BRL (www.brl.ie) and AXIS (www.axis-ballymun.ie) have worked together to develop the Plan B project to promote the use of vacant properties for temporary artistic and creative uses in order to breath vibrancy and energy back into these units. The project itself and the temporary use(s) must accord with the principles of the aims of the regeneration process, 'the physical, social, economic and environmental regeneration of the area.

The aims of the Plan B project are very simple and extremely positive: -

- (a) To create active and vibrant street frontages
- **(b)** Promoting the work of the creative / artistic industries
- (c) Attract new visitors to Ballymun 'Destination Ballymun'
- (d) Through association with local arts, culture and design, the area will prosper and grow

A pilot project is commencing in Unit no. 4, Shangan Neighbourhood Centre in March. The unit will be utilised to construct a recycled playground. It is hoped that the project will be successful and can expand into additional vacant properties.
